Session I. Section I. The Role of The Kuwaiti Competition Authority and the Legislative Competition Framework

Policymakers typically introduce Competition Laws in order to allow consumers to benefit from lower prices, higher quality goods and services, and greater innovation in the market. To achieve these goals, there must also be correct and neutral enforcement of the Competition Law by Competition authorities. This enforcement is essential to create a culture of competition, ensuring a healthy and fair business environment that supports a well-functioning economy.

Given the importance of Competition policies as stated above, Kuwaiti policymakers promulgated the first competition Law in 2007 (law No. 10/2007). Due to the several legal loopholes in the adopted Law, in 2020/2021, and in line with Kuwait's 2035 vision, policymakers promulgated a new Competition Law (No. 72/2020) and its implementing regulation (No. 14/2021). These two reforms were intended to eliminate old loopholes, strengthen the enforcement practices by the authority, and better organize the mergers and acquisitions regime. This session will highlight the important and fundamental changes and reforms that the new Competition Law and its implementing regulation have guaranteed.
