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FINANCIAL STATUS OF THE COMMISSION'S PROGRAMMES EXTRABUDGETARY RESOURCES

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
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
Introduction

- 1. The present report on the financial status of the extrabudgetary resources of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) covers the biennium 1992-1993 ended 31 December 1993. The accounts reported on relate to all extrabudgetary resources from different contributors in support of activities financed from the regular budget. Excluding the Trust Fund for ESCWA Regional Activities, which is the subject of a separate submission (see document E/ESCWA/17/8/Add.3), these resources amounted to \$US 1,218,350.
- 2. The present report summarizes extrabudgetary resources for ESCWA activities in the biennium 1992-1993 in financial terms. After a brief overview of the activities and financial situation of the Commission as a whole, the remaining sections of the report provide financial information relating to the major sources of extrabudgetary funds. Annex I to the present report provides a consolidated statement of expenditure covering all extrabudgetary funds for the biennium 1992-1993. Annex II shows the combined status of trust funds for the biennium 1992-1993.

I. OVERVIEW

- 3. The increasingly serious financial crisis faced by the United Nations in recent years continued during the biennium 1992-1993. This is clearly reflected in the decreasing amounts allocated to ESCWA by the major sources of extrabudgetary funds.
- 4. The major sources of extrabudgetary funds for the past four bienniums have been the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM), the Government of the Netherlands and the Government of France. In addition, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) supported ESCWA by financing three posts. During the 1992-1993 biennium the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) was also one of the major contributors to the activities of the Commission.
- 5. It should be noted that, in spite of the Commission's efforts, there has been a steady decline in the level of extrabudgetary resources available to ESCWA. Resource utilization from UNDP, which amounted to US\$ 1,549,809 during the biennium 1986-1987, was only US\$ 263,721 during 1992-1993. The UNFPA contribution and resources utilized decreased from US\$ 1,753,019 during 1990-1991 to only US\$ 460,354 in 1992-1993, owing to a change in funding policy.
- 6. UNIFEM contributions have also declined steadily: the contributions totalled US\$ 400,501 in 1986-1987; that amount had decreased to US\$ 117,034 in 1992-1993. Furthermore, the Government of the Netherlands discontinued its annual contribution in 1985, and the balance of its Trust Fund is expected to be utilized by the end of 1994. As for the Trust Fund for ESCWA Regional Activities, the last contribution was received in 1983. The Government of France continued its support to ESCWA with a contribution received in September 1991 and applied to the biennium 1992-1993.





- 7. The above figure provides a graphical comparison for the last four bienniums of overall expenditure for the five major sources of extrabudgetary funds, namely UNDP, UNFPA, UNIFEM and the Governments of the Netherlands and France. The table below shows expenditure from the main sources of extrabudgetary funds for the past three bienniums as a percentage of total expenditure of extrabudgetary funds.
- 8. The Commission has continued its efforts to raise voluntary contributions for extrabudgetary financing of the programme of work, and of studies and advisory services requested by member States. In this connection, further contacts have been made with Arab organizations and institutions at the regional and national levels. Cooperation has progressed with the Islamic Development Bank (IDB), the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development (AFESD) and the Arab Gulf Programme for United Nations Development Organizations (AGFUND). Visits have also taken place to institutions outside the region.

II. HISTORY OF ACTIVITIES

A. United Nations Development Programme

- 9. The financial support of UNDP for ESCWA activities dates from 1979. The contributions have been utilized to finance projects in the fields of planning and training; finance and banking; natural resources; statistics, surveys and censuses; transport, communication and maritime activities.
- 10. In 1992-1993 allocations of US\$ 263,721 from UNDP contributions were utilized to finance the following projects in the ESCWA region:
 - (a) Biogas technology for rural areas;
 - (b) Establishment of engineering infrastructure industries;

- (c) Fellowship in planning;
- (d) Promotion of industrial entrepreneurship;
- (e) The ad hoc Interregional Symposium on Gas Development and Market Prospects by the Year 2000 and Beyond;
- (f) Support of the Arab Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development;
- (g) Environmentally conscious low-energy housing for population activities.

B. United Nations Fund for Population Activities

- 11. The contribution of UNFPA to ESCWA activities started in the year 1975. The funds have been utilized to finance projects related to population and demography.
- 12. During 1992-1993 allocations of US\$ 460,354 from UNFPA contributions were applied to the following projects in the ESCWA region:
 - (a) The Arab Population Conference;
 - (b) Technical support services team.

C. United Nations Development Fund for Women

- 13. The cooperation between UNIFEM and ESCWA dates from 1978. It has focused on projects to further the development of women.
- 14. In 1992-1993 the amount of US\$ 117,034 allocated from UNIFEM contributions was utilized to finance the following projects in the ESCWA region:
- (a) Developing a regional training programme for women trainees specialized in socialization of children;
- (b) Strengthening the statistical capacity for promoting the participation of women in development;
- (c) Participation of women in the food and textile industries: five case-studies;
- (d) Diffusion of biogas technology in the People's Democratic Republic of Yemen: development of rural women in Al-Habeel village;
 - (e) Regional guide for Arab women on employment laws and legislation;
 - (f) Support of Arab associations for women and development;
 - (g) ESCWA development initiatives.

D. United Nations Environment Programme

- 15. UNEP contributions to ESCWA, initiated in 1990, have been utilized to finance projects related to the environment.
- 16. In 1992-1993 the amount of US\$ 139,361 from UNEP contributions was used to finance the following projects:
 - (a) Second Arab Conference on Perspectives of Modern Biotechnology;
- (b) Assessment of water resources in the ESCWA region using remote sensing techniques;
- (c) Strengthening environmental planning and management capabilities in Jordan;
- (d) Regional survey of production and consumption of substances harmful to the ozone layer in the countries of the ESCWA region.

E. Government of France

- 17. The support of the Government of France for the programmes of ESCWA, dating from 1980, has focused on support of the regular budget. Contributions have been made in two forms, namely the provision of both experts and funds for ESCWA to undertake certain activities. These have concerned projects related to agriculture, natural resources, human settlements, environment, industries, micro-electronics and statistics.
- 18. The Government of France contributed US\$ 54,655 for 1992-1993. These funds served to finance the following projects:
 - (a) Collection, harmonization and assessment of national data;
 - (b) Micro-electronics and informatics in Western Asia;
- (c) First Arab Conference on Perspectives of Modern Biotechnologies in Arab Countries;
 - (d) The Autonomous Village project;
 - (e) Second Arab Conference on Perspectives of Modern Biotechnology;
- (f) Workshop on the Integration of Science and Technology in the Development Planning and Management Process.
