






Circular Economy

Principle 1: Preserve and enhance natural capital by controlling finite stocks and balancing renewable resource flows.

By adopting circular principles, cities can significantly reduce their greenhouse gas emissions

Principles to Policies



Principle 1: Preserve and enhance natural capital by controlling finite stocks and balancing renewable resource flows

- Increase material efficiency: Increase efficiency in product manufacture or use by consuming fewer natural resources and materials
- Reduce service level: Make product redundant by abandoning its function
- Substitute a technical solution by a more material-efficient one
- Substitute a technical solution by a more material-efficient one
- Increase share of renewable materials
 1) the shift to renewable energy and
 materials; 2) the reclaim, retain, and
 regenerate ecosystem health and
 return recovered biological resources to
 the biosphere.

Principle 2: Circulate products and materials as their highest values

- Make product use more intensive (e.g. through product-as-a-service, reuse and sharing models or by putting multifunctional products on the market)
- Increase lifetime
- Re-use of a product which is still in good condition and fulfils its original function (and is not waste) for the same purpose for which it was conceived
- Repair: Repair and maintenance of defective product so it can be used with its original function
- Rethink (design)


Principle 3: Eliminate waste and pollution

Increase share of secondary materials.
 Recover materials from waste to be reprocessed into new products, materials or substances whether for the original or other purposes.

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This vision can only be achieved through a life-cycle approach by taking a holistic view of economic activities and looking at the whole value chain, as part of a circular economy

Circular Economy Action Plans



The circular economy (CE) paradigm is increasingly considered as a means for governments and businesses to mitigate the negative impacts of the linear economy and bring more resilience to supply chains.

- The principles of a circular economy affect nearly all industries and their global value chains.
- Addressing sectors that have a high environmental impact and high potential for circularity can provide opportunities for investment and economic growth
- It becomes evident that production patterns must change rather sooner than later in order to:
 - (i) contribute to social, economic and environmental value creation and
 - (ii) prepare for and adhere to changes of existing regulations towards more circular business and trade activities.
- Planning for circularity



Validate the Action Plan with the Ministry and Stakeholders

• Create a common mindset and ownership by the stakeholders

- Ensure inclusivity (all perspectives taken into account and analysed A stakeholders mapping and a plan, developed together with all the stakeholders (inclusivity), led by governmental authorities (leadership embedded in law) with the concrete and practical solutions tailored to the countries' unique context
- Set up a timeline
- Strengthen policy, <u>regulatory</u> and financial incentives in all potential CE sectors (waste, construction, water, agriculture, manufacturing, etc.)
- Support life cycle assessments and cost-benefit analyses to make a comprehensive, long-term economic case for circularity
- Support the identification of "hotspot" sectors of unsustainable consumption and production and associated circular economy opportunities
