

Importance of international data flows

- Over the past decade, international data flows have increased global GDP by more than 10 per cent.
- Data transfers are estimated to contribute \$2.8 trillion to global GDP—a share that exceeds the global trade in goods and is expected to grow to \$11 trillion by 2025.
- Data flows are driving the transformation of traditional industries such as agriculture, logistics, and manufacturing.

Need for protecting personal data flows



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
Towards an Arab regional data framework

Cross-border data flows enable rapid economic growth and accelerates the internationalisation of the Arab businesses

Cross-border data flows enable businesses in the Arab region to grow in a digital world, especially micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) and start-ups

Cross-border data flows enables the mutualization of the data storage and networking infrastructures, therefore reducing the direct implementation costs.

Key challenges to harmonisation

Create practical rules for consent, notification and purpose

Ensure accuracy of personal data and provide channels for updates

Provide security safeguards for personal data

Avoid inappropriate retention of data

Establish reasonable breach notification parameters

Introduce remedies as deterrent

Refer to evolving jurisprudence on privacy

Harmonizing national frameworks


- Conduct a landscape analysis to see where they stand in terms of privacy;

- Review the experience and case studies of other regional governments to understand common challenges and potential paths forward.
